

City Administrator & Staff Update

2022.10.21

- Chamber: Attached is a copy of the 10/22 Chamber Board Packet. The legislative session seemed to go well today. It was recorded and will be on the chamber website as well.
- **Budget:** Budget memos and attachments have started going out to departments this week. A little early but trying to get a head start with everything going on.
- Water Tower: It appears we have substantial completion after meeting with the engineers and staff yesterday. This issue will likely be the date 10/14 or 10/17. I'm sure they will look to find additional arguments to justify a reduction in disincentives, but things are well documented.
- Community Visioning: The Community Visioning Team started off this past Monday with a brief
 introduction to the schools as they like to ensure student participation. The School Board
 unanimously agreed to coordinate access to WB students. The Kickoff event in Ames is on 11/3.
- Mt. Pleasant Street Project: "I just got off the phone with Norris Asphalt. They plan to start milling on 10/31. They anticipate two days of milling. The HMA crew would then be in later that week to start that portion of the work. I let Mike know but thought I would follow up with an email to you. I will let you know if something changes. Thanks, Matthew P. Walker, PE".
- Water Quality Initiative and Funding (FYI) Impact 7G is an environmental firm that I have worked with in the past and they have worked with SEIRPC as well.
 - o Per Mike Fisher with Impact 7G:
 - Zach, let me know if this could help any communities...some may need improvements along streams/creeks or simply native landscaping between a creek and ped trail for example.
 - IDALS recently sent out their request for applications for urban water quality initiative projects. Projects that qualify include wetlands (this is the hot practice for 2022), bioretention cells, swales, native landscaping, and pretty much any practice listed in the lowa stormwater management manual or lowa nutrient reduction strategy. It also covers the purchase of land to complete the project. This annual funding opportunity has always had a maximum award of \$100k and requires a match equal to the amount of funding requested. However, this year they removed the cap on the amount that could be requested. Applicants are encouraged to "request what is needed for the project". I've heard the max is \$250k. Judy mentioned some cities you're working with on other projects Mason City, Burlington, and Marshalltown if you think there might be interest from those communities (or any others) in applying for these funds let me know. If so, I can look through some of their upcoming projects or stormwater problem areas to see if the original plan could be modified to fit the requirements of this funding opportunity.
 - If there is interest, the next step would be to complete a pre-application (app is straightforward, 20-30 hours depending on the complexity of the project). Pre-apps are due November 18. If it is approved, the full application is due in late

- December/early January. Funding is available as early as April. Construction would need to be completed by the end of 2024.
- As of now, we're talking to a few cities and County Conservation Boards about pursuing this funding and will likely submit applications on their behalf. Wouldn't hurt to have a few more! Let me know if you want to chat more about this. Request from IDALS is attached.

IT (Newberry)

Weekly Update:

This week I am working on restoring an Intrusion Detection system that crashed last week. We do not back these up as the cost would be too much and we have Splunk that keeps the log data in the cloud. I am also working with our new partner SHI.com to get quotes for next fiscal year for Bitdefender Gravity Zone and Barracuda Spam Filter. These are the major items that expire next year. I already have the quote back from knowbe4 which will be \$3,000 for another 3-year term. This week with our current security software that is in place I was able to detect an infected android phone that was connecting and relaying information to the dark web. I was able to notify the person who was able then to remove the malware from the device. This was on our BYOD network, so it had no chance of infecting anything internally. The reason I am using SHI as our vendor is they don't treat us like a little city like CDWG and give us competitive pricing. There has been an uptick in what they call drive by malware infections, but Bitdefender does a good job at detecting these. I am including the executive view breakdown so that you may see how well the EDR software works.

Definitions:

Drive-by downloads are a common method of spreading malware. Cybercriminals look for insecure web sites and plant a malicious script into HTTP or PHP code on one of the pages. This script may install malware directly onto the computer of someone who visits the site, or it may take the form on an IFRAME that re-directs the victim to a site controlled by the cybercriminals. In many cases the script is obfuscated, to make it more difficult for security researchers to analyze the code. Such attacks are called 'drive-by downloads' because they require no action on the part of the victim — beyond simply visiting the compromised web site: they are infected automatically (and silently) if their computer is vulnerable in some way (e.g., if they have failed to apply a security update to one of their applications).

An intrusion detection system (IDS) is a system that monitors network traffic for suspicious activity and alerts when such activity is discovered.

<u>Splunk</u> is an advanced, scalable, and effective technology that indexes, and searches log files stored in a system. It analyzes the machine-generated data to provide operational intelligence. The main advantage of using Splunk is that it does not need any database to store its data, as it extensively makes use of its indexes to store the data.

Spam Filter is a program used to detect unsolicited, unwanted, and virus-infected emails

Dark Web is the part of the World Wide Web that is only accessible by means of special software, allowing users and website operators to remain anonymous or untraceable.




